Satpuda Foundation's conservation philosophy focuses on communities living in and around protected areas. The Foundation believes that these communities need to be roped in as allies in the conservation movement and that long-term, sustainable conservation is not possible only through the action of outsiders.

As part of this strategy, the Foundation follows a multi-pronged strategy of trust-building activities with communities, assisting them in meeting some of their basic needs, building their capacities and training and equipping them to shift to a lifestyle which is not based entirely on forests and forest produce.

Towards this end, the Foundation

- helps organise medical camps in which villagers get free medical treatment and medicines
- undertakes education programmes focusing on nature and wildlife conservation
- acts as a bridge between the villagers and development agencies in solving local development needs and
- assists villagers in getting gainful, legal employment and also organizes training programmes which help equip unemployed villagers with skills which will help them either get jobs or start their own small businesses

Highlights of activities in 2011-2012

- *14 shramdhaans for water conservation*
- *Joined Forest Department staff on patrols on 22 occasions*
- *Plantation programme in 4 villages – total of 110 saplings planted*
- *6 nature trails conducted for village children, 2 conservation rallies*
- *Cleaning of waterholes in forest on 7 occasions*
- *Promotion of organic farming to reduce impact of chemicals in areas near wildlife areas*
- *107 visits to village schools to talk to children about nature and wildlife conservation – attended by a cumulative total of 4,379 students*
- *39 film shows on nature and wildlife conservation -- attended by 2,598 villagers*
- *14 unemployed youths placed in jobs with our assistance*
- *Assisted 9 village girls in getting trained in programmes such as tailoring/embroidery and beauty care*
- *72 medical camps – cumulative total of 2,920 villagers provided with free treatment and medicines*
- *Various initiatives in Sawara village to promote self-employment results in villagers earning total of around Rs 53,000/- in 2011-2012. They have earned over Rs1,00,000/- in the past two years*
- *Working to prepare micro-plans for villages in our area of operations in Pench*

Conservation activities

Water Conservation

The Foundation organises programmes involving local villagers and school children to build temporary structures known as check dams/stop dams which help to retain water and to recharge water table of the adjoining areas. These structures are typically built on streams, known as nallahs, and are selected with the help of local forest officials and villagers.

In addition, we also help build soak pits next to wells/hand pumps. These soak pits collect the water which is spilt while being drawn from the hand pump or well and help to recharge the water table.

Fire fighting

Each year, our teams assist in preventing fires, fighting fires, which are very common in the dry, deciduous forests of this region. We start with awareness programmes from the spring months onwards and then extend our efforts to physically fighting the fires, which typically occur during the summer months.

Patrolling/cleaning of waterholes

Our staff voluntarily joins hands with local forest officials in anti-poaching patrols and help in cleaning waterholes meant for wildlife.

Organic farming

Our team promotes organic farming by conducting programmes explaining the benefits and by arranging for training to interested villagers. It also assists in building compost pits. The focus is to reduce the impact of chemicals on farmland next to prime forest areas.

Activities involving Mumbai-based volunteers

An IT education module has been started in Sawara with the help of SF volunteers Bipasha Majumdar, Kirti Chavan and Rajashree Khalap. They have collected computers and liaised with Pratam, an NGO which focuses on education, to bring IT to the village kids. Currently, they have arranged for 4 desk tops and one laptop to be placed at Sawara ZP School.

The initiative is led by Kirti Chavan, who is training the students and monitoring their progress.

Another activity undertaken by Mumbai-based supporters is helping villagers to make and sell products such as bags, handicrafts and products made from lantana. Ms Rajashree Khalap, who is actively involved in this activity, gave fresh designs of bags and handicrafts to the villagers for them to copy and make on their own. Once the

villagers attain the required degree of finish in their work, our Mumbai volunteers will look for suitable marketing opportunities.

Livelihood programmes

The Foundation is conscious that villagers have relatively limited livelihood options. It is not easy to preach conservation to people struggling for a living. The Foundation has, therefore, made a focused effort to provide employment opportunities to unemployed youths and to organise programmes at which they have been able to learn skills which equip them to either get jobs or start their own small businesses.

We organised various training/skill-enhancement programmes at Pench, including programmes on driving four-wheelers, tailoring and embroidery, honey bee rearing.

Highlights:

- *A total of 14 youths have got jobs either directly through our efforts or thanks to our support*
- *We had also organized youths of Sawara to start retail selling of T-shirts. The youths were introduced to wholesale dealers in Nagpur from whom they purchased the garments in bulk and sold them for a profit in the village markets. So far , they have earned around Rs 15,000/-*
- *Similarly, a group of ladies for whom we had organised training in tailoring and embroidery, has earned Rs 3,120/- thanks to the efforts of our Mumbai-based volunteers Rajashree, Bipasha and Kirti*
- *Another group of villagers whom we motivated to form a tribal dance group and whom we introduced to resorts and helped to get performance bookings, has earned around Rs 36,000/-*
- *Villagers whom we helped train in making products from lantana have earned Rs 2,600/-*
